Lisa Sazer

I grew up in the beautiful seaside town of Marblehead, MA, graduated from Temple Sinai Hebrew School there, and was active in the USY. Marblehead had a large Jewish population so I was always very comfortable in the town and had many Jewish friends. My family has always been very proud that my great-uncles, Maurice and David Berlin, built the Berlin Chapel at Brandeis University.

After college I was living in Brookline and was active in the CJP Young Professionals of Boston. My husband Morris and I married in 1986 and “made aliyah” as we say, from Brookline to Newton in the same year. Shortly after, Morris started attending the Temple Emanuel Minyan to say kaddish for his

father and found the community so warm and welcoming we decided to join the Temple.

After our children were born in the early 1990s, we heard excellent reports about the TE Preschool, so we sent both of our boys there, and later to the Religious School, and from there to the Bimah for their B’nei Mitzvah. They both attended Prozdor after that.

Early on, we joined a TE havurah, and we are still together after over 30 years! At one point, Rabbi Wes asked if I would consider co-chairing the Havurah Committee, which places families and individuals into havurot. I accepted, and, along with my co-chair Toby Rodman, we spent five years bringing many folks together through the Gate of Community into small groups for socialization, prayer (Shabbat Alive! followed by dinner is a favorite of my havurah!), life cycle gatherings, learning, and during Covid, plenty of Zooming.

I joined Sisterhood and really enjoyed organizing two community-wide Shabbat dinners, two Mah Jong tournaments, and sitting on the Sisterhood Board.

I am a visual artist, and I also love to sing, dance, and act. I was active in recent years in the Basically Broadway performance group and in both college and local theater productions. I’ve been creating art from a very early age. I’ve studied many techniques and media both in college, through adult education, and via the Internet.

I received my B.A. from Smith College, having majored in Studio Art. I also attended Dartmouth my junior year and Rhode Island School of Design for a post-graduate year. I show my work at Newton Open Studios and other local art venues. Recently, my artwork was selected to be showcased in the TE Museum in the Temple lobby, and it was heartening to hear from many members who enjoyed seeing my work there.

My primary passion is drawing. I use drawing as the foundation for much of my painting, and I am now venturing into multi-media collage, which is like drawing with paper. Color is my other passion. I’m inspired by the work of artists who are major colorists. Major influences have been Matisse, Corita Kent, Milton Avery, and David Hockney, among others.

I am inspired by interiors and the beauty of the natural landscape and seascape, although I don’t create totally realistic works. I call my style “expressionist,” because I attempt to bring to the canvas my emotional response to the visual world in a slightly abstracted, personal, and sometimes whimsical way that is my artistic “signature.” I hope that the viewer will look at my work and feel joy and appreciation for another way to see.

My spiritual observance of Judaism is expressed in how I continually marvel at the miracle of Creation and try to bring that beauty to the canvas for others to enjoy. My passion for the visual world also extends to my deep concern for our changing environment due to global warming. I hope that the future holds many glorious days ahead for other artists like me, and viewers like you, to admire.

Cindy’s Legacy

Cynthia Farkas Levinson, known to many of us as Cindy, grew up at a time when women were working toward more equality in Jewish and other communities. She loved Hadassah Blocker’s pioneering Adult Bat Mitzvah program which served as a jumping off point for her. She embraced new opportunities within Sisterhood and the greater synagogue community and consequently grew from student to teacher, enlightening us with her scholarly but down-to-earth Divrei Torah.

Cindy was a Shabbat morning regular, insisting that she was not coming for God but “for her tribe.” She embodied the importance of community, people, and

friends, looking forward to Shabbat where she would learn at the Rabbi’s Talmud class, sing at shul and have coffee at kiddush.

Every rabbi at TE lovingly saw Cindy as their “bar plugta,” an Aramaic term meaning your study partner who sharpens your ideas by respectfully challenging you. Cindy asked the best questions, made every conversation better, and made all of us think more deeply. She truly believed that the ability to disagree civilly and thoughtfully was essential to any healthy community of diverse people, especially in the current climate.

Children and families were central to Cindy’s professional and synagogue work. Her doctoral dissertation was on attachment behavior in infants and her 40-year career as a clinical and neuropsychologist focused on the problems and needs of children, families and communities. She served on many professional boards though she did not see herself as a leader. However, her colleagues and friends did, appreciative of her dependability, common sense and practical wisdom.

After Cindy died, her husband, Dan, wanted to link her name with Temple Emanuel’s in some way that would live on after her. He says, “Selfishly it gave me something to hold on to. But I knew the program needed to further and deepen her interests. I also wanted anything in her name to be something the Temple wanted. A worthy program was in the works so that helped focus the fund’s mission.”

Dan continued, “Cindy was modest and ducked the spotlight. In Freud’s list of familiar life goals, she valued honor over fame. The opportunity to join with others in efforts to build a better world from the local level guided her day-to-day life. She cherished her friends and colleagues at the temple, especially the women of Sisterhood. From programs and prayer to committees, lectures and classes, TE was her second chosen family, something that connected to the religious traditions of her family even though she had more interest in the aspect of community than ritualistic observance. It was natural to link her name with programs that will strengthen families and help parents and children build stronger connections and better skills to cope with everyday challenges.”

Now Cindy’s family and friends rejoice in the opportunity to have her legacy live on with the establishment of the Cynthia Levinson Fund for Parenting Education. Its goal is to help parents balance the many pressures and needs that affect them and their families.

Last spring, the fund initiated its first program entitled “New Parents + Newborns Creative Support Group,” co-sponsored with the Paint Bar. This well-received program has continued over the summer and will continue in the fall.

One participant, Alyssa Bickoff Elfman, grew up at TE and is now participating with her toddler. Alyssa explains, “We have met so many great families through these programs and it even inspired me to become the Young Families Chair, bringing in new programming including the Paint Bar classes!”

A weekly summer outdoor Drop-In Play Program took place on the newly renovated Preschool playground. Plans are underway for conversations with a clinical social worker where parents will have the opportunity to share the strengths and challenges of parenting during these unprecedented times, learn with and from each other, all while providing social opportunities for parents to connect, thanks to the Cynthia Levinson Fund. May Cindy’s memory always be a blessing for us.

“I Want Your Job!”

This is what I told Ilene Beckman, (who happened to be my sister's preschool teacher many moons ago,) as a brazen 20-something year old interviewing to be the new 5th grade Religious School teacher when she asked me about career goals. As soon as it came out, I was embarrassed by my chutzpah, and tried to walk it back. Ilene, with her loving and easygoing nature, made me feel at ease, and has continued to point proudly at that moment as we continued to learn and grow together with her as my mentor and dear colleague.

If I could turn back time, what I would have said, more politely of course, is that *I am extremely passionate about improving supplemental Jewish education from within.*

Growing up in Stoughton, Massachusetts, and later, Palm Harbor, Florida I was a “Hebrew School hopper.” Having gone to Jewish Day School for kindergarten and first grade, it was hard to later find a Hebrew School that was the right fit. I was always craving more Hebrew, more knowledge. So, when the time came, I enrolled in the ultimate Jewish Day School: Brandeis University.

In all my classes at Brandeis, I was struck by the vast knowledge and skills gap that existed between me (a self-proclaimed Hebrew School nerd), and my counterparts who were graduates of Jewish Day Schools. “It doesn't have to be this way,” I always thought. It was then that I decided to dedicate my life's work to advocating for the Jewish community

to take the education and experience of our supplemental students just as seriously as our Jewish Day School students. I truly believe that *with the right amount of thoughtfulness, resources and professionalism, the knowledge and skills gap does not have to be so wide!*

As a leader in supplemental education, I always ask myself, “what skills, experiences, basic knowledge do students attending Jewish Day Schools have, that we can bring to our supplemental students as well?” I would like to see a proficiency approach to Hebrew, Israeli dancing, project-based learning and a love of Israel.

I could not be more thrilled to put some of these lofty goals into practice as the new Religious School Director at Temple Emanuel, and yes... take Ilene's job as she enjoys retirement. (I know I have big shoes to fill!)

As a Sunday morning 5th grade teacher, I learned what a special community this really is. The teaching staff at this religious school is all top-notch, passionate and serious professionals, who work together as a team to bring such a deep love of learning to the students. The students are *excited* to be here, are so proud of their Judaism, and are constantly craving to learn more. (My 5th graders last year *asked* me to please start speaking to them only in Hebrew...) The fact that the amazing clergy dedicate so much time to the Religious School and Chai385 program, the calendar of rich special events, even the robust supply closet, (yes, educators get excited about supply closets,) are all indicative that this is a community which places the utmost value on educating the next generation of Jewish leaders.

I am humbled to be joining such an amazing team and am most excited about working with the incredible clergy, staff and lay leaders here. I look forward to getting our creative juices flowing, putting our heads together, and continuing to make the Temple Emanuel Religious School and Chai385 Program the place where our students are excited to learn and grow as proud Jews!

For years, my dear friend, Rabbi Jen Gubitz, and I have been dreaming about creating a vibrant, progressive davening space for all ages in Cambridge. As is often the case, this dream was born out of need and yearning. Young adults living in Cambridge kept talking with us about how it felt like they were in a progressive Jewish desert—Cambridge has lots of traditional and Orthodox davening options, but not a lot of opportunities for engagement with progressive/liberal Jewish communities or new-age/contemporary prayerful experiences.

Additionally, after years of organizing young adult programming, Jen and I felt that many of the programs offered in Boston for young adults are mostly social, maybe educational, but that there are few places where young adults can go for spiritual renewal that are designed with them in mind. Finally, we felt strongly that young adults are too often segregated away from multi-generational community and wanted to create a prayerful space where young adults could sing together with community members from all ages and stages. After many conversations and lots of visioning, ROOTS was born.

ROOTS is a once-per-month opportunity to gather and sing together. Each program is organized around a theme: we've celebrated light, growth, freedom, springtime, and learning just to name a few, and we bring music from pop culture, musical theater, traditional Jewish prayers, camp songs, niggunim, and everything in between.

The experience of ROOTS is cathartic—we pick the songs that will bring the most joy and try to craft an experience that will be filled with fun and meaning. And we try to finish our celebration with Havdalah to send everyone into the week with joy. All ages, stages, and abilities are welcome and we would love the chance to get to sing with you!


